Alumnus of the Year Alvin Kroeker ('58)

Comments by Alumni Director Jim Doerksen ('67):

Alvin Kroeker ('58) is our worthy selection of Central Christian School's Alumnus of the Year Award! Alvin and his wife, Jan, can be seen in their regular spot in the bleachers at many of Central's home football games. They have been enthusiastic long-term supporters of the school. Their two daughters attended CCS during the years 1978 through 1985. Daughters Kathy Kroeker Perry graduated in 1982 and Susan Kroeker Penner in 1985. Susan has been teaching at Central for over 32 years. Alvin was on the school's

board of trustees and was board chairman for several years. They are wonderful examples of commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ and have been faithful and generous stewards of their time and resources.

I grew up during the era that Central Kansas Bible Academy was in its infancy. I was raised in a Christian home with parents who were genuinely concerned about the future and type of education that was available to their children. Since some of the founding members of CKBA were part of my extended family as well as members of my home church, it was only natural that I would be encouraged to attend CKBA upon my completion of elementary school. I had joined the family of God at an early age, but it was while I was a student at CKBA that I made my serious commitment to following my Lord and Savior in

a life of stewardship. After graduating in 1958, I allowed my involvement at Central Christian School to fade until it was time for our daughters to make a choice in their education after finishing the eighth grade. They both chose to attend Central Christian School-the school had

undergone a name change by this time. During those years, my wife, Jan, and I became serious about Christian education, and I was asked to serve on the school's board of directors.

While I was on the board, we became keenly aware of the meaning of stewardship, and if we are to be serious about this lifestyle, it must affect our entire lives. Stewardship to me is not restricted to our pocketbook alone, but it sets the tone for a way of life that affects and controls our very being, including our time, our relationships, and our finances. During the time I spent as a board member, part of that time as board chairman, the school was experiencing great financial need. It was not uncommon for the school's bank account to drop too low to cover the payroll for our staff in a timely manner. In late-night meetings, we board members would challenge each other financially in order to pay our dedicated staff who, on more occasions than I would like to admit, were asked to be patient with us for their paychecks. The board made a commitment to honor our staff by meeting payroll even if it meant borrowing money to make it happen. Those decisions were what started years of debt for Central Christian School, and praise be to God that era has now finally come to an end. I served on the board until our youngest daughter Susan Kroeker ('85), now Mrs. Penner, began her teaching career at Central Christian. I felt that my presence on the board could be viewed as a conflict of interest, so I stepped away from the board and have allowed her to carry on the torch for the last 30-plus years.

As I look back to those years of involvement and leadership at CCS, I realize that God has a purpose for everything that happens, whether it is time spent volunteering to help construct and build the facility that CCS occupies at the present, or helping to make decisions at the board level.

It is incredible to witness what has become of the vision a group of Mennonite men representing various churches from the Inman and Buhler area had concerning the future education of their next generation. In my opinion, their bold vision was also perceived by the greater community as being a Mennonite school even though that was never the intent. This quickly became a limiting factor for growth as well as financial

resources. It took years of concentrated intentional planning to overcome this perception and to realize Central Christian School's potential impact within the community where it was located.

I am ever so grateful to the past and present leadership at CCS that has and is carrying out the original vision for the future of Central Christian School. CCS is making a positive difference in our world as students graduate and move on to become Christian leaders and Christian parents in our society that is desperately in need of seeing God's grace lived out daily. So, I am thankful for the influence that Central Christian School had in my life and in the lives of so many students who have been touched by CCS and its committed staff over the years.

When I consider how God has led and directed our lives over the last 62 years of married life, I realize that much of life's experiences are directly related to our original commitment to stewardship. As farmers, we were privileged to own our time and be available to respond when a need was perceived, whether that was a next-door neighbor or someone devasted by a natural disaster.

During the last several years on the farm and after retirement, we connected with an organization called Mennonite Disaster Service, responding to storms and natural disasters in the continental United States and its territories. We served as long-term field leaders for a period of three months each winter for about five years. In 2009, we were contacted about becoming directors for Region III, which covered 14 states. This position also placed us on their bi-national board which covered all of the U.S. and Canada. The experiences and contacts that God allowed us to experience during those years of service were second to none. When we are truly committed to allowing God to work His will, the ride is incredible. At times, it felt like chaos and the situation was out of control. but when God is directing our lives, there is always a long-range plan. Needless to say, we often felt insecure for the lack of experience but willing hearts. We are ever so grateful that God can and does desire the service of the retired community. One may retire from his job, but we should think twice about retiring from the Lord's service.

The school has been successful in eliminating over \$400,000 in debt. The gravel parking lot has been transformed into a concrete paved parking lot. The classrooms completion project is almost finished.

Estate planning—Have you considered including CCS in your estate plan? CCS has been a recipient of these types of gifts, and they have an eternal impact!


Prayer—Students are influenced by more things today than ever before. Would you please pray that our students would stay on the straight and narrow?

Ecclesiastes 3:1–2 "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted."

What does the fall season look like to you? Does it appear chaotic and messy? Those are accurate descriptions, but I would add that it's beautiful.

It might appear messy, but there is no wrong way to make a leaf pile. The leaves look amazing on the trees or on the ground. They are a painter's palette full of colors that create beauty together. It can't be messed up because it is doing exactly what God created it to do. It is going through the process of dying so that the new life can come.

This is part of the God-ordained process of the seasons. The spring couldn't happen if the fall didn't happen first. Without the death, there's no rebirth. The extraordinary example that God gave us is in Jesus—it started with death, and then came the new life. It's both a beautiful gift and a sacrifice. As you look out the window in this season, I hope you're encouraged that this is the first step of God's gift of new life.
